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A Message from Dean Lisa Kirtman

In the wake of current events, parents and caregivers alike have expressed their deep appreciation for the role (and patience) of educators. Educators impact individuals, families, communities, and our society. But I am more convinced than ever that Educators Change the world.

A lot of attention is being placed on systemic racism (unfair and unequal policies and practices that give one race an advantage over another), but institutionalized racism is not new, and certainly not absent in the education system. When I say Educators Change the World, I am referring to how the education system as a whole, and teachers as conduits of that system, affect the trajectory of so many lives. Students in K-12 spend the majority of their day with their teachers, making them one of the most influential people in their formative years. A teacher can encourage and inspire, creating lasting memories and fondness. In higher education, an instructor can change the trajectory of a student's career, which in many cases can perpetuate or end generational poverty.

I am particularly proud of the College of Education faculty and staff during these unprecedented times. Supporting our Students during COVID-19: A Message from Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, Dianna Lopez

During this pandemic crisis, the goal of the college is to focus on leadership on maintaining a strong culture of care and creating a healthy, safe, and inclusive community where our students can thrive. The work that we are doing would not be possible without the support of effective collaboration and community partnerships. In recent months, the COVID-19 crisis has drastically changed the lives of millions around the world, including college students. Life as we once knew it has changed, leaving many students and their families without employment, and struggling to make ends meet. Basic needs such as food, transportation, and housing were widespread issues among college students even before the pandemic. This crisis has compelled our students to seek out resources, funding, change their way of living, and adapt to the crisis's pressures. To assist our students during this time, as the assistant dean for student affairs for the College of Education, I address these issues by providing holistic intentional intervention and guidance to help them navigate and access available resources such as on-campus resources and community social services. With so many needs to address, my work is dependent on effective collaborations with campus and community partners, vital to connecting students with services necessary to resolve the concerns that impact students' personal, professional, and academic success. For example, one solution is to direct students to where they can get help when it comes to food insecurity. I partner with our on-campus Tuffy's Basic Needs Center and with food banks across the state to provide our students with the information needed to access available food based on their local. Free Virtual Tutoring Program

With the ongoing need to adapt to a virtual teaching and learning environment, our College of Education launched a free virtual tutoring program in early April 2020, to help K-12 students with their homework while distance learning from home during the COVID-19 pandemic. The virtual tutoring is led by our student teachers who have all received college degrees and are in the process of receiving their teaching credentials. Not only does this provide an opportunity for our future teachers to find ways to practice and adapt to the current environment but it also helps students in need within our community.

Dig Deeper: Virtual Summer Reading Camp

Dig Deeper is a virtual summer reading camp specifically designed to engage high needs students in grades 1 through 9. In partnership with the Center for Healthy Neighborhoods, the Hazel Miller Croy Reading Center launched the program with a book bag pick-up at Richman Elementary in Fullerton on June 13. Each student received several books, along with stationery and art supplies to support literacy activities. The program is organized through a ClassDojo site where students and parents communicate with the teachers, access curriculum and submit projects. The students receive prizes for completing literacy activities that go along with the books they are reading.
